I. Getting Paid and Working in the Arts: Can They Go Together ? Introduction

“That’s a Nice Hobby You Have, But We Have to Be Realistic.”

Employment in the arts can be challenging to obtain, with or without a label of disability. For those living with the realities of limited educational opportunities, poverty, and inadequate transportation and physical accessibility, getting paid for a creative calling can seem out of reach. There is yet an additional hurdle that people with disabilities have identified, a constraint based upon misinformation and prejudice: Families, teachers, counselors, and service providers not uncommonly believe that someone who has a disability is incapable of earning money in a creative field, and that such work is unsuitable for them.¹

Are they right? Due to initiatives of the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Arts and Disability Center, and events such as the recent *Bodies of Work* festival in Chicago, we see compelling evidence of the accomplishments of professionals with significant disabilities in many fields of the arts. It’s well documented that arts dollars play a key role in the nation’s economic vitality. Now we’re also learning that creative industries employ a lot of Americans. How many? A 2005 Congressional report revealed the U.S. has more than 578,000 arts-related businesses employing almost 3 million people.² This means *over four percent* of the nation’s businesses *and over two percent* of the nation’s jobs are arts-related!

Work in creative fields encompasses the full range of performing, literary, and visual arts. These careers include jobs in technology-related areas, such as

sound engineering, video editing, web design, etc. Jobs can be found on stage or “behind-the-scenes”, for example, technician, proof reader, gallery assistant, usher, musical instrument repair person, or box office manager. Arts-related careers encompass many allied professions: advertising copywriter, entertainment lawyer, music librarian, art supply retail sales clerk, stage electrician. The potential to earn money through creative work can’t be ruled out because of the type or severity of a disability. Dancers in wheelchairs, actors with Down syndrome, Deaf percussion players, painters with developmental disabilities... Do we need any further proof?

How the Need for Information Resources was Identified

Since 2002, Indiana has seen a growing awareness about arts careers for people with disabilities. Under the leadership of Vsa arts of Indiana, the Indiana Institute on Disability and Community, and the Indiana Arts Commission, a statewide advisory group was convened to identify needs and issues facing artists with disabilities. This process laid the groundwork for improving access to employment in the arts.

A federal grant was awarded to sponsor Indiana’s first-ever statewide forum on careers in the arts for people with disabilities. Held in Indianapolis in October 2004, *Indiana Art Works: Employing Creativity* was attended by over 100 people. Participants gained information pertaining to the multi-faceted aspects of education, employment, arts, and disabilities. The gathering’s synergistic energy focused on the tasks of (1) surveying barriers along the road to an arts career, and (2) mapping out some routes to circumvent them. The new group ArtsWORK Indiana has since emerged to take a leadership role in facilitating careers in the arts for people with disabilities.

Access to information, these diverse stakeholders agreed, is key: where to find training, mentoring, and financial support; how to become self-employed, to create jobs through customized employment; how to get business skills and the benefits of connections via professional networks. This directory of resources is intended to help widen and level out some of the more difficult pathways to work in the arts.
